Q&A With Sara Turnquist

- **What sparked the idea for a Christmas sequel to Hope in Cripple Creek?**

I love Christmas novellas. They are the perfect length to consume in an afternoon or over a few days. That allows for the consumption of many stories during the holiday season. I had finished Hope in Cripple Creek and wanted to portray what other challenges Wyatt and Katherine might face as a married couple with a ready-made family. That was the spark. And that gave way to the

- **Why is this a novella as opposed to a full-length novel? Was that on purpose?**

It was a purposeful thought. As mentioned above, I adore novella length for the holiday season. I like the regular novel length too, but the season can tend to be so busy that it can take even longer for a mom of younger children to consume a full-length story. I wanted something that had meat to it, but was closer to bite-sized, if you will allow the metaphor.

- **We revisit Katherine and Wyatt...how has their relationship changed?**

They have grown more secure in their relationship, but there are still challenges that face them. They have become reliant on each other, but there can be a danger of codependency... especially in those early years of marriage. My personality lends itself to that, so I wanted to explore that just a little.

Q&A With Sara Turnquist Cont...

- **What was your favorite scene to write in Christmas In Cripple Creek?**

I loved the final scene when everything came together. Sometimes when I write novels and novellas, there is a rush to the finish. Not that I am rushed, necessarily, but the action speeds up at the climax and the resolution follows that closely and can feel a bit more fast-paced. I loved in this novella, that we kind of sit in the moment with the sweet family.

- **What was the most challenging scene to write?**

The moment when Katherine is in the church. I loved the scene, but I had never experienced this aspect of pregnancy/labor. So, I had to talk with friends who'd had this happen to adequately capture the reality of that moment.

- **Where there any new characters that you enjoyed writing?**

I loved having an older Jack and Susie. I have enjoyed all of the different stages with my children. So, having Jack starting to struggle with the loss of his biological parents as a little bit of an older child and having Susie as a toddler...was precious to me.

- **How does this book compare to the other books in the series?**

Well, it is shorter. It is holiday-themed. And it is a sequel that better explores the relationship in the next phase (early marriage). The other books take on the newness of a relationship leading to marriage.

~ Little People Nativity ~

I bought the cute Little People Nativity for my baby girl that first year, thinking it would be a safe nativity decoration that she could look at and interact with. I had no idea it would be the central part of one of our favorite Christmas traditions. Part of the idea was taken from another mom in a mom group, part evolved.

So, we take the nativity characters and scatter them around the house in the main areas...some a little hidden (based on my kids' ages and abilities). Except baby Jesus. He is hidden extremely well. Usually in my sock drawer.

Starting December 1st, then every 5 days after (Dec 5th, 10th, 15th, 20th) we feature the story of one of the characters, based in order on Scripture (e.g. the first night is Mary's story). I tried to keep as close to Scripture as possible while telling the story in a way that they can easily understand on their level.

So each night, the kids are told who to look for (e.g. Mary). They find that figure and we tell the story (most recently with a memory verse featured). Then the kids put the figure in the Nativity barn under the tree. And all December, they are trying to spot the characters, especially baby Jesus as he is the most well-hidden (they never find Him... He is so well-hidden because if they find Him, it kind of detracts from the point).

So, as characters join the Nativity, we are waiting on Jesus. And Christmas morning, when they come downstairs, Jesus is in His place in the Nativity. They are usually very excited to see Him finally.

That's my hope...that they will be excited about Jesus showing up on Christmas and it's not just about the presents, but about the coming of Jesus and what He means to us.





The Nativity Story

DECEMBER 1st – MARY (Luke 1:26–55)

God sent the angel Gabriel to the town of Nazareth in Galilee. There was a young woman who lived there named Mary. Gabriel had a message for Mary. He said to her, "Don't be afraid. God is pleased with you, and you will have a son. His name will be Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of God Most High."

Mary did not understand these words. "How can this be?" she asked.

The angel answered, "The Holy Spirit will come down to you, and God's powers will come over you."

Mary put her faith in God. "I am the Lord's servant," she told the angel. "Let it happen as you have said." Mary sang a song of praise to God:

*With all my heart I praise the Lord, and I am glad because of God my Savior
God cares for me From now on, all people will say God has blessed me.*

DECEMBER 5th – JOSEPH (Matthew 1:18–25)

"She will bear a Son; and you shall call His name Jesus, for He will save His people from their sins."

Matthew 1:21

Mary was engaged to Joseph to be married. Before they got married, she became pregnant. At that time, Joseph didn't know about the angel who visited Mary and what the angel told her. Joseph was a good and righteous man, he didn't want to make problems for Mary and he planned to end the engagement in secret.

DECEMBER 5th – JOSEPH (Matthew 1:18-25) Continued

After he made his plan, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, “Do not be afraid to get married.” The angel told Joseph about the baby, that it was God's plan. The angel said, “She will have a son and you shall call Him Jesus, for He will save His people from their sins.”

DECEMBER 10th – DONKEY

JESUS IS BORN (Luke 2:1-7; Matthew 1:18-25)

- How did the fact that this story takes place at Christmas affect the book? Did it add or distract?

Christmas Pistachio Cake

- 1 pkg (2 layer cake) yellow cake mix
- 1 pkg (4 serving size Jello Pistachio instant pudding
- 4 eggs
- 1 c Water
- 1/2 cup oil
- 1/2 tsp almond extract
- 1/4 cup chocolate syrup

Directions

- Combine cake mix, pudding mix, eggs, water, oil, and extract in a large mixer bowl.
- Blend, then beat at medium speed for 2 minutes.
- Measure 1 1/2 cups of batter; stir in chocolate syrup.
- Spoon batters alternately into a 10-inch Bundt or tube pan sprayed with Pam.
- Zig Zag Spatula through the batter to marble.
- Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes.
- Cool for 15 minutes. Remove from pan and finish cooling on a rack.
- Sprinkle with powdered sugar.



Christmas Fudge

- 2 (12 oz) pkg semi-sweet Chocolate chips
- 10 oz jar marshmallow creme
- 12 oz can carnation evaporated milk
- 4 c sugar
- 1 lb pecan pieces (optional)
- 1 stick margarine
- 1 tsp vanilla

Directions

- Cook sugar, evaporated milk, and margarine together until cooked and boil for 8 minutes.
- Pour over chocolate chips and marshmallow creme and blend until creamy.
- Add vanilla & pecans
- Pour onto a cookie sheet covered with wax paper.
- Refrigerate & then cut into squares



Christmas M&M Cookies

- 1½ cups plus one tablespoon all-purpose flour, see note
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- ½ teaspoon baking soda
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ½ cup unsalted butter softened but still cool
- ½ cup granulated sugar
- ⅓ cup brown sugar, lightly packed, make sure it's fresh and soft
- 1 large egg
- 2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract
- 1½ cups M&M's or a mixture of M&M's and chocolate chips, divided
- ¼ cup holiday sprinkles

Directions

- Gently stir in M&M's and chocolate chips. I usually add about 1 generous cup into the batter, and the rest gets pressed on top of the cookies before baking.
- Place the sprinkles in a shallow bowl.
- Scoop balls of cookie dough, between 1½ and 2½ tablespoon portions. Gently press a few M&M's onto the top of each dough ball then press the top of each ball into the bowl of sprinkles. You can bake the cookies right away (they'll be on the thinner side) or chill the dough balls in the fridge for about 15 minutes to ensure they bake up with a nice thickness.
- Place dough onto prepared baking sheets leaving an inch or two for spreading. I like to make sure the dough balls are mounded higher rather than wider so that the cookies aren't too thin.
- Bake for 8-11 minutes (see note), until the edges of the cookies are set but the center is still slightly underdone; this will create a soft cookie. See note about shaping the cookies as soon as they come out of the oven.
- Place the baking sheets on wire racks and allow the cookies to cool completely. They will firm up as they cool.

Christmas Puppy Chow

Christmas Puppy Chow

- 8 cups (240 g) Chex cereal
- ½ cup (128 g) creamy peanut butter
- 4 tbsp (57 g) unsalted butter
- 1 cup (140 g) semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 1 tsp (5 ml) vanilla extract
- 2 cups (240 g) powdered sugar

Holiday Mix-ins

- 1 cup red and green M&M's
- 2 cups chocolate-covered pretzels
- 1 cup mini peanut butter cups
- 1 cup salted caramel or butterscotch chips

Directions

- Heat the chocolate chips, peanut butter, and butter in a medium saucepan. Frequently stir the chocolate, butter, and peanut butter to ensure they melt and are well combined.
- Pour the Chex cereal into a large mixing bowl.
- Once the chocolate and peanut butter mixture has melted, pour half the mixture onto the cereal. Mix the cereal until mostly combined with the chocolate peanut butter. Repeat with the remaining half of the chocolate peanut butter mixture. Mix well until all the cereal pieces are well coated.
- Pour the chocolate peanut butter-coated cereal into a gallon-sized ziplock bag filled with powdered sugar. Shake well until all the cereal pieces are coated in the powdered sugar. If you would like to coat the muddy buddies in powdered sugar twice, reserve ¼ cup (30 g) of powdered sugar in another ziplock bag.
- Pour the muddy buddy mix onto a parchment-lined baking sheet. Allow the coated cereal pieces to set for about 30 minutes.
- Make the mix-ins. I love adding a little salt to break up all the sweetness.
- To make the chocolate-covered pretzels, melt 2 oz. white chocolate in a small bowl. Drizzle over 15-20 mini pretzels. Top with holiday sprinkles and set for about 30 minutes.
- Add the mix-ins to the Christmas muddy buddy mix. Stir until all the M&M's, salted caramel chips and chocolate-covered pretzels are mixed in.
